Columbia Gorge Region, OR & WA

The Challenge

Despite rich tourism and agriculture industries, the Columbia Gorge region is vast, with residents dispersed across remote towns. They face poverty; health services are hard to access, and 34 percent of residents worry about running out of food.

The Intervention

With a renewed focus on inclusion, health care providers and community partners are collaborating to assess medical needs and allocate resources according to priorities like food, housing, transportation, jobs, and dental and mental health services.

Key Activities

- Established Coordinated Care
 Organizations (CCOs) and engaged residents from underserved groups in decision-making
- Adopted a customer-centric point of view toward addressing community health, e.g., bilingual health surveys and monthly community meetings
- Addressed food insecurity through "Veggie Rx," a prescription program that helps residents buy fresh produce
- Raised funds to certify 52 community health workers to connect underserved residents to needed services
- Created a comprehensive school-based dental program for 1st and 2nd graders
